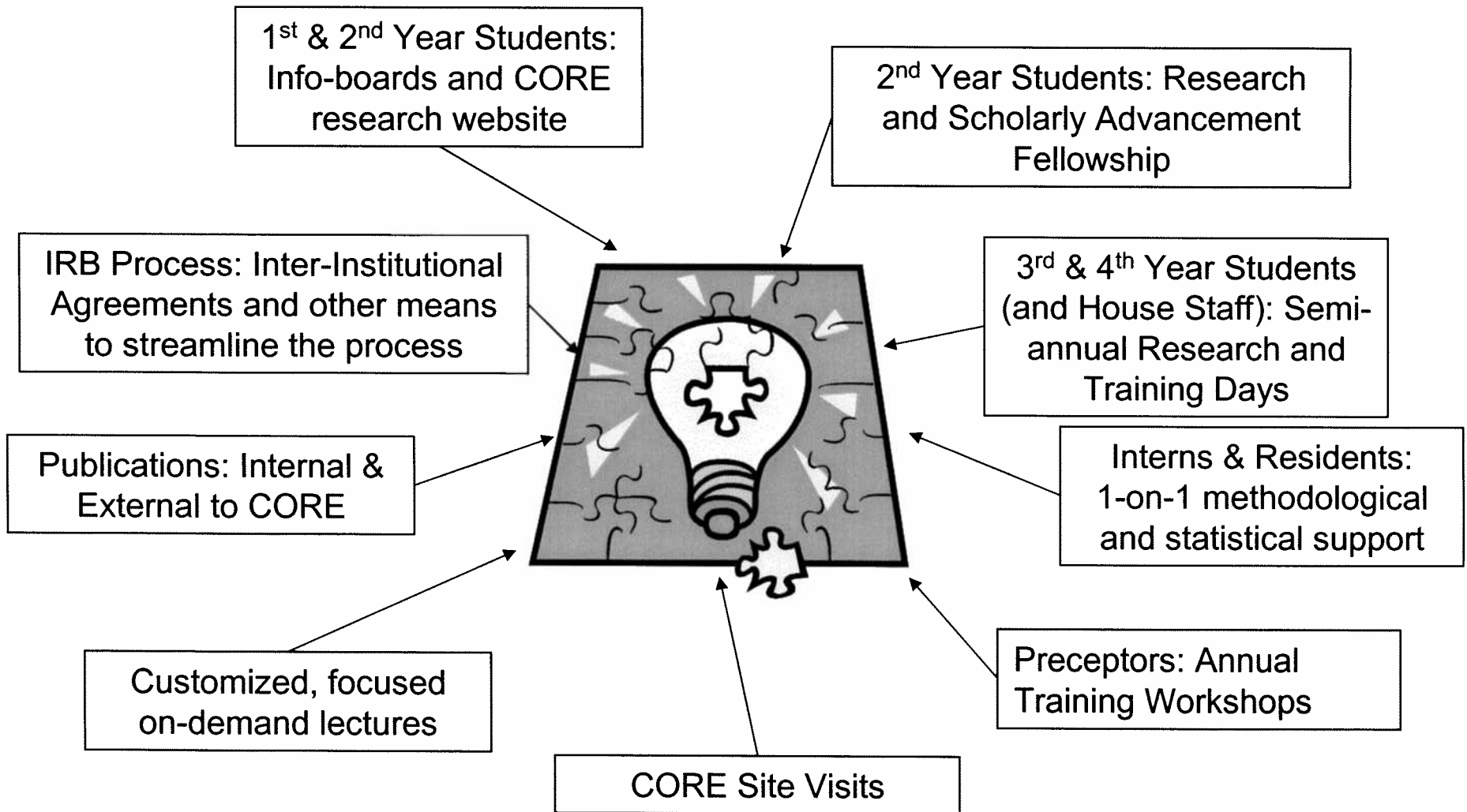


CORE Research Action Plan: Growing the Research Culture



An Info-board has been installed in the basement of Grosvenor Hall, directly in front of student's mailboxes. We intend to relocate this board to Irvine Hall, where we believe students like to congregate.

The Research and Scholarly Advancement Fellowship is a summer program open to any student between his/her 1st and 2nd year of medical studies. A series of seminars on basic research skills include: Clinical Research, Searching Medical Literature, Introduction to Research on Human Subjects (IRB), Introduction to Sponsored Programs, Introduction to Basic Statistical Procedures, Research Dissemination, and Journal Review

Semi-annual Research and Training Days for 3rd & 4th year students (and any interested House Staff) will be provided at aggregated CORE sites. Lectures will address key components of clinical and evidence-based research as well as IRB issues.

The IRB process will be streamlined by the establishment and implementation of inter-institutional agreements between the OU-IRB and each CORE (hospital) IRB.

Residents and other CORE-based researchers receive 1-on-1 support in research methodology as well as statistical support.

An annual workshop will be offered to all preceptors and attending physicians. This training will be delivered in Columbus and linked to all sites via our distance-learning network. Key topics in research will be presented.

CORE site visits will be used to coordinate customized, invited lectures for specific programs. RPACS can also request specialized support.

In addition to dissemination of specific research findings at OOA, AOA, RSAC & RPAC Research Days, and St. Vincent's & St. Elizabeth's Research Days, CORE will also produce scholarly works that support and enhance research within the Osteopathic community and profession.
